Shalom, chaveirim - hello, friends -

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Nearly 300,000 people came to the rally in Washington, DC. 300,000!!! And the crowd - while not exclusively Jewish, was largely so.

There were people putting on tefillin and there were countless kippot. I heard Hebrew, English, Yiddish, Spanish. I saw joy and sadness. I saw gratitude and signs of love, support, worry, hope, determination. We chanted "Never again!" And thought to myself: what a hollow slogan that feels in this moment. We chanted "Bring them home!" (referring to the hostages) and I couldn't get past "Bring" because of my tears so I held my sign with those words higher. The speakers were many and outstanding - my personal favorite was Dr. Mijal Bitton, who is an outstanding thinker, writer, and researcher at the Shalom Hartman Institute. If you listen to no other speaker ... I urge you to listen to Dr. Mijal Bitton, starting at 44:05.

Among the most memorable moments: Though they all said, effectively, the same thing, the leaders of the United States Senate and House of Representatives stood ARM IN ARM, HAND IN HAND, TOGETHER (!!!) ON

THE DAIS. The day had a thousand priceless pictures - but on what other topic does our bicameral, bipartisan voice of the people stand on any dais together holding hands?? Their message was clear: Hamas is a terrorist organization that unleashed horror upon Israel and the threat of Islamic Jihad is real and must be stopped. The resulting rise of antisemitism in America is unacceptable and Israel has every right to defend its citizens.

Was I at the same rally?

Since leaving the rally I have been disappointed, stunned and angered by the press coverage of this momentous event. This was the single largest gathering for Israel in Washington DC — ever — and yet *The New York Times*, *The Washington Post* and National Public Radio were unable to bring themselves to acknowledge the power of this day.

The NYTimes downplayed the role and impact of the rally. The front page included a dramatic picture of the Capitol building, a few small Israeli flags and maybe thirty people in the photo. The caption reads "thousands attend rally" and the story is buried on A21. The Washington Post couldn't even put anything on their front page and buried the historic event of the largest crowd to rally for Israel in history in its metro section. And NPR, in a move that is remarkably rare for them, farmed the story out to another news service, which simply said "thousands marched."

Why does any of that matter? Because people go to the news outlets for information in order to create their opinion. If news is predigested, readers are misinformed and make their judgments accordingly.

Is it ok that John Hagee spoke?

Pastor John Hagee, of Christians United for Israel, spoke at the rally. One of the first emails Amy and I saw after the rally was from a couple of colleagues, who were upset Hagee was allowed to speak. Why? Because Hagee is a right-wing Christian Evangelical and for many in the non-orthodox Jewish world holds social opinions which are antithetical to their sensibilities and sensitivities.

Let's think about it this way.

Jews and Christian Evangelicals hold Israel as sacred and recognize the importance of Israel as a democracy that is a Liberal country. Christian Evangelicals are not supportive of Israel because of some messianic goal.

They are supportive of Israel because there are some moral absolutes. Supporting Hamas and believing that chants of "From the river to the sea" mean anything other than genocide will remove Liberalism not just from Israel but from Western civilization.

The phrase "politics make strange bedfellows" exists for a reason. I may not agree with Evangelical Christians on a range of issues — but that does not mean I will never ally myself with them or that I see them as immoral. Quite to the contrary, I strenuously object to the liberal Jewish world maligning them, or marginalizing their voice.

A Peaceful Gathering

Final thought for now: I saw no graffiti. There were no calls for genocide. People were waiving American flags and Israeli flags. Banners spoke of Jewish pride, Jewish fear, Jewish aspirations. The thousands of Jewish day schoolers and the thousands of Jewish college students not only took the day off from school, they aligned themselves with Jews from throughout the Jewish world and Jewish time. There was anger at Hamas and cruel legislators who speak of cease fire without acknowledging the ills perpetrated against Israel. No one climbed on top of statues or buildings and took down U.S. flags to raise Israeli flags. And when the rally was over, people walked peacefully to their cars, buses, trains or in my case: a coffee shop to sit down after standing for five hours.

After 40 days of hardly breathing and many restless nights, yesterday, I smiled and felt happy and for just a few minutes felt like we were not alone. And actually, that feeling started on Monday, when we raised the Israeli flag at Town Hall in New Milford with over 30 of us present with our mayor and other concerned citizens. We are not alone. The battle is monumental but we are not alone.

Am Yisrael Chai - b'yachad n'natzeiach - the people of Israel lives, together we will succeed!
